protests and their mutual support networks built relationships around a more radical vision of what democracy should look like. Simply killing the bill wouldn't be enough, as conditions for the working class sucked before it existed. A desire for more revolutionary change has emerged, requiring more drastic tactics. Some have started organizing a general strike, a complete work stoppage across all trades, a tactic used in the US in 1886 to win the eight-hour workday and in Egypt this year to overthrow a 30-year dictator (see wisconsin. iww.org). If enough of us unite together, WE, not the politicians and their corporate backers, can determine the conditions of our lives and workplaces.

Worker's struggles in Wisconsin and beyond

In Wisconsin, an uprising against the repression of workers' rights has reinvigorated our imaginations of what a grassroots labor movement can accomplish. The Republican governor, Scott Walker, posed a bill that would strip public employees' unions of their right to collectively bargain, a right won over fifty years ago through workers' struggles. This came

as a surprise to most Wisconsinites, including many Republicans who had voted for Walker, as this was absent from his election platform. Protesters came out in droves, initiated by the grad students' union of UW Madison who delivered over a thousand tongue-in-cheek Valentine's Day cards to Walker's office in the Capitol building. Walker didn't seem to get their message, so they decided to stay until he would. For the next twenty-five days, protesters ranging from a few hundred to a few thousand occupied the building, sleeping overnight on the marble floors and decorating the walls with posters and banners. They were given this extra time to spread the word about the horrible implications of this bill, thanks to the courageous efforts of the fourteen Democratic state senators who fled to Illinois, temporarily preventing a vote on the bill. Back in Madison, hundreds of thousands streamed in to join the protests. Like Tahrir Square in Egypt, the occupation of public space at the Capitol building represented the people's demand to have their voices heard, while serving as a place for converging and enacting real democracy together. Half-wheat sourdough sandwich (840g/loaf)

Water (36%), OG ww flour (30%), OG white flour (30%), veg oil (3%), NC Honey (1%), Salt

Whole-wheat sandwich bread (840g/loaf)

OG ww flour (57%), Water (35%), Vegetable oil (4%), NC Honey (2%), FT Molasses, Salt, Yeast

"Jewish" Rye bread (789g/loaf)

Water (40%), Organic unbleached white bread flour (34%), Organic whole rye flour (16%), Oraganic whole wheat bread flour (6%), Caraway Seed (1%), Salt (1%), Canola Oil (1%), Anise seed

Applesauce Muffins (415g/half-dozen)

ingredients: organic whole wheat pastry flour (33%), NC apples (32%), Pecan milk (18%), NC Honey (12%), Canola oil (3%), Apple cider vinegar (2%), Baking Soda, Cinnamon, Ginger, Salt, Citric Acid, Cloves, Nutmeg

Pizza Crusts (330g/each)

Water (36%), OG ww bread flour (29%), OG white flour (29%), Olive Oil (3%), Salt, Yeast
