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Why I Support the Almighty Latin King and Queen Nation (ALKQN)

I first heard about the ALKQN organizing in North Carolina when King J (Jorge Cornell) spoke on a panel with survivors of the Greensboro Massacre about the past and present of civil rights organizing in Greensboro at the third NC Rising conference. J spoke about starting an ALKQN chapter in Greensboro after seeing a surprising amount of police violence and harassment in his community--and seeing his people struggling so fiercely to make ends meet. King J spoke about using popular education campaigns, taking legal action, and creating broad reaching media campaigns--like running twice for

City Council.

When describing the ALKQN, King J spoke about an organization clearly reminiscent of the Black Panther Party or the Young Lords, a grassroots organization rooted in people of color communities with explicit guidelines against drug use and violence. King J also spoke about their work organizing a gang truce in Greensboro and their work with folks inside the NC prison system.

After inspiring conversations with King J and some of the other Kings after the panel, we talked about how we could start to work together more.

The next time I had the privilege to share space with members of the ALKQN, we were at a demonstration against the use of solitary confinement against politicized prisoners at the NC Department of Corrections in Raleigh, officially organized by the ALKQN and the Prison Books collective. Kings and Queens from the triad, the triangle, and ENC came out, and we shared stories, chants, love and rage. It was a powerful day, and I left feeling like I had made new friends in struggle.

Why I Support the Almighty Latin King and Queen Nation (ALKQN)

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A few weeks after the demonstration, I got a phone call that King J's house was raided and that 13 members of the ALKQN were indicted by a federal grand jury on racketeering charges. The indictment denies the validity of the organization and equates association with the ALKQN with criminal activity. These charges are clear retaliation for the ways the ALKQN has exposed and fought against the daily violence of the police. The State has used gang laws against political activists for decades, and the RICO charges faced by the ALKQN are similar to the conspiracy charges brought against leftist activists across the country. This is a tactic of the State to break up organized resistance in North Carolina.

Taking a stand to support the ALKQN during this trial is a part of the fight to deepen collective resistance for all of us.

On November 21, three of the Kings were acquitted of all charges, and three were found guilty. King J/ Jorge Cornell was convicted of three counts of racketeering and is facing life imprisonment. The case is not over. King J plans on appealing the verdict,

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and many in Greensboro will continue organizing against this unjust conviction.
