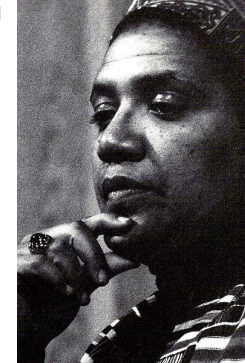

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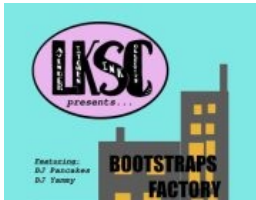

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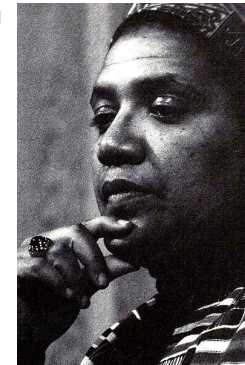

WHAT WE BAKED!

Whole Wheat/ Pan Integral (840g)

OG Whole wheat bread flour (55%), Water (36%), Non-GMO canola Oil (3%), NC Honey (3%), OG fair-trade molasses (1%), Salt, Yeast.

Half-Wheat Sandwich Bread

Water (38%), Organic ww bread flour (30%), Organic 14% white bread flour (16%), Organic white bread flour (15%), Canola oil, salt

White Sandwich Bread

OG white bread flour (63%), Water (35%), Salt, Yeast.

Potato-Rosemary Artisan Bread

Organic unbleached bread flour (44%), Water (27%), NC potatoes (16%), Roasted onion (6%), Organic whole wheat bread flour (5%), Salt, Garlic powder, Yeast, Fresh Thyme from Arnette Ave., Dried Rosemary from Nadeen's garden, Dried Oregano from Noah's mom's garden.

Pumpkin-Spice Muffins

Organic whole wheat pastry flour (30%), Pumpkin puree (26%), NC honey (13%), Canola oil (10%), NC pecans (8%), Organic coconut milk (6%), NC sorghum molasses (4%), Apple cider vinegar, Baking powder, Baking soda, Salt, Cinnamon, Ginger, Nutmeg, Cloves

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Pizza Crusts (coming Wednesday!)

Durham county water (38%), OG 14% white flour (29%), OG ww flour (29%), Olive oil (3%), Salt, yeast



First batch of products produced under worker control

The workers of Vio.Me., a building materials factory in Thessaloniki, Greece, which was abandoned by its owners, have been unpaid since May 2011. By decision of their general assembly they have decided to **occupy the factory and operate it under direct democratic workers' control**. After a year-long struggle that has attracted attention and solidarity in Greece and worldwide, they are kick-starting production on February 12, 2013, after 3 days of intense mobilization. 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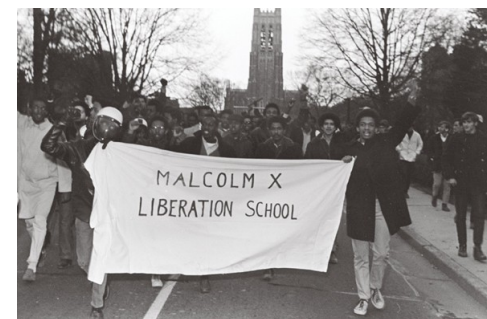


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Durham Moments in Black History

In 1967, 50 members of Duke's Afro-American Society take over the Allen Building (home of Duke's Administration), and demand establishment of an Afro-American studies department, and an increase in Black undergraduate enrollment to 29 percent, among other demands. Durham's mayor mobilized the National Guard. Police confronted about 200 students, most of them white, blocking the building's entrances. When objects began to fly, police fired tear gas without warning. For an hour police and students charged at and retreated from each other. In protest, most of the Black students walked out to form the Malcolm X Liberation University, which held classes in Durham for 2 years and in Greensboro for another several years. 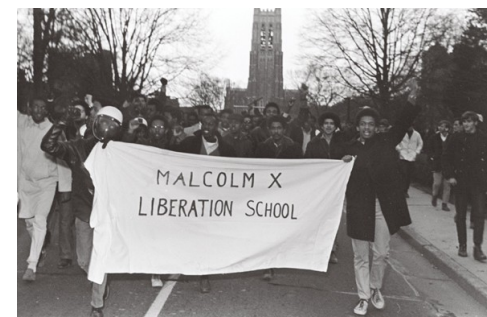
